PLENARY SPEAKERS

Professor Norman Segalowitz, Concordia University, Canada



Bio:

Norman Segalowitz is Professor of Psychology at Concordia University in Montréal. He obtained a B.Sc. from McGill University (1968) and a doctorate from Oxford University (1972). He joined Concordia University in 1973, serving twice as Psychology Department Chair (1977-80; 1990-93). He is currently an Associate Director of the Centre for the Study of Learning and Performance. Prof.

Segalowitz's research focuses on the cognitive processes underlying adult second language (L2) acquisition. His work focuses on the nature of automatic and attention-based processing underlying L2 fluency. He is especially interested in the problems many adults face in learning an L2, and in how cognitive science might contribute to more effective L2 instruction. He also studies language barriers to healthcare access for linguistic minorities. Prof. Segalowitz has published extensively in leading journals and handbooks. His book *Cognitive Bases of Second Language Fluency* (Routledge) appeared recently (June, 2010).

Professor Peter Robinson, Aoyama Gakuin University, Japan



Bio:

Peter Robinson, B.A. Wales, M.A. London, Ph.D Hawai'i (1994,SLA) is Professor of Linguistics and SLA in the Department of English, Aoyama Gakuin University, Shibuya, Japan, where he teaches courses in Applied Psycholinguistics and SLA. His main areas of research are in individual differences and the structure of aptitude for

adult SLA; implicit and explicit artificial and natural language learning; and task complexity, and task-based language learning. Recent and forthcoming publications include the Handbook of Cognitive Linguistics and Second Language Acquisition (co-edited with Nick Ellis), 2008, Routledge; Task-Based Language Learning, 2011, Blackwell; and the Routledge Encyclopedia of Second Language Acquisition, to appear 2012, Routledge. He is series editor of the book series Cognitive Science and Second Language Acquisition, published by Routledge.

Professor Susan Gass, Michigan State University, USA



Susan M. Gass is University Distinguished Professor at Michigan State University where she serves as Director of the English Language Center, Director of the Second Language Studies Ph.D. program, Co-Director of the Center for Language Education and Research, and Co-Director of the Center for the Advancement of Language Teaching. She received her BA from the University of California at Berkeley, an M.A. from U.C.L.A. and a Ph.D. from Indiana University. She has published widely in the field of second language acquisition and is the co-author with Larry Selinker of *Second Language Acquisition: An Introductory Course* (Routledge) and with Alison Mackey of *Second Language Research: Methodology*

and Design (Routledge). She is the winner of the Distinguished Faculty Award at Michigan State University, the Ralph Smuckler Award for International Studies at Michigan State University, the Paul Pimsleur Award for Outstanding Research, the Michigan Association of Governing Boards Award and the AAAL Distinguished Scholarship and Service Award. She has served as the president of AAAL and as president of AILA.

Professor Michael Walsh, University of Sydney, Australia



Bio:

Since 1972 Prof. Walsh has carried out fieldwork in the Top End of the Northern Territory, mainly in the Darwin-Daly region. This has been a mixture of academic endeavours as well as consultancies since 1979 mainly relating to Aboriginal land issues. From 1999 he has been involved in the revitalization of Aboriginal languages in NSW. From 1982 up till the end of 2005 he was part of the teaching staff of the Department of Linguistics, University of Sydney. Since

then, as an Honorary Associate, Prof. Walsh has continued his research interests especially through a large ARC grant involving a team of linguists and musicologists running from 2004 to 2009 [<http://azoulay.arts.usyd.edu.au/mpsong/>]. This project aims to document the song traditions of the Murriny Patha people and was triggered by community concern to preserve these traditions for future generations.
